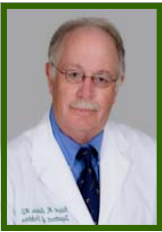

You wish you could give them good news. You wish you could give them hope. You wish you could give them strength. You wish you could give them joy. Well...*you can.*

The Make-A-Wish Foundation of Central and Northern Florida’s mission is to grant the wishes of children with life-threatening medical conditions to enrich the human experience with hope, strength and joy. You can help a child in a way that goes far beyond any treatment or prescription by referring a child to receive a wish.

The Suncoast/Tampa Bay Region of the Make-A-Wish Foundation relies on medical professionals (doctors, nurses, social workers, child-life specialists—people just like you) to refer children to the organization. There are thousands of potential wish children who have extraordinary wishes that are sometimes only seen in story-books. A child’s wish is a powerful tool that can be the motivation needed to keep a child focused on their future. Any child between the ages of 2 ½ and 18 with a life-threatening medical condition may be eligible for a wish. The child’s wish typically falls into one of our four categories: I wish to go; I wish to have, I wish to meet; and I wish to be.

This year, we expect to grant 85 wishes in one year in the Suncoast Region of Hillsborough, Hernando, Pinellas, Polk and Pasco counties.

When you refer children for a wish, you give hope, strength and joy to keep fighting a very grown-up battle.
