



Provide access to internal medicine clinic to adults in the community in which they live





✓ Patient Financial Services

✓221 patients screened; 64 qualified for assistance programs

✓ Laboratory Services- on site phlebotomist

✓ SMH Pharmacy Residency Program

✓ Pharmacists, pharmacy residents collaborate with the IM physicians and residents to identify medication or therapy issues
 ✓ Assist in finding lowest cost medications for un/underinsured and those transferring between coverage

✓ Counsel patients on medication accessibility, administration, and compliance

On Site Services

✓ Liaison to SMH Community Medical Clinic- access to specialty care

✓ Case Management

✓ Provides resources for anticoagulation patients

✓ Legal Aid

✓ Partnered with Legal Aid Manasota. One of 3 Medico-Legal Partnerships in Florida.
