- Diagnosis and management of pediatric orthopaedic disorders, including pediatric rehabilitation and trauma.
- Diagnosis and management of adult orthopaedics and joint reconstruction, multi-system trauma, surgery of the spine, including disk surgery, spinal trauma and spinal deformities; hand surgery; foot surgery in adults and children, orthopaedic rehabilitation, including amputations and post-amputation care.
- Increasing role in the surgical management for complex total joints and spine surgery.
- Residents are approved to do any procedures that are deemed appropriate and necessary under the direct supervision of the attending.
