#### Think SHARP

OSHA's Safety and Health Achievement Recognition Program awards and exempts businesses with exemplary safety and health management systems from OSHA inspections for a period up to two years. Qualifying businesses must participate in a comprehensive on-site safety and health analysis and also have Days Away, Restricted or Transferred (DART) and Total Recordable Case (TRC) rates lower than their industry average.

Do you know what hazard is occurring in the above image? Read below to find out.

#### Hazards:

<u>1926.451(b)(1)</u> Each platform on all working levels of scaffolds shall be fully planked or decked between the front uprights and the guardrail supports.

<u>1926.451(e)(1)</u> When scaffold platforms are more than 2 feet (0.6 m) above or below a point of access, portable ladders, hook-on ladders, attachable ladders, stair towers (scaffold stairways/towers), stairway-type ladders (such as ladder stands), ramps, walkways, integral prefabricated scaffold access, or direct access from another scaffold, structure, personnel hoist, or similar surface shall be used. Cross braces shall not be used as a means of access.

<u>1926.451(f)(7)</u> Scaffolds shall be erected, moved, dismantled, or altered only under the supervision and direction of a competent person qualified in scaffold erection, moving, dismantling or alteration. Such activities shall be performed only by experienced and trained employees selected for such work by the competent person.

<u>1926.451(g)(1)</u> Each employee on a scaffold more than 10 feet (3.1 m) above a lower level shall be protected from falling to that lower level. Paragraphs (g)(1) (i) through (vii) of this section establish the types of fall protection to be provided to the employees on each type of scaffold. Paragraph (g)(2) of this section addresses fall protection for scaffold erectors and dismantlers.

<u>1926.451(g)(1)(v)</u> Each employee on a walkway located within a scaffold shall be protected by a guardrail system (with minimum 200 pound top rail capacity) installed within  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches (24.1 cm) of and along at least one side of the walkway.

<u>1926.451(h)(2)(ii)</u> Where there is a danger of tools, materials, or equipment falling from a scaffold and striking employees below, the following provisions apply: [1926.451(h)(2)] • A toeboard shall be erected along the edge of platforms more than 10 feet (3.1 m) above lower levels for a distance sufficient to protect employees below, except on float (ship) scaffolds where an edging of  $\frac{3}{4} \times 1\frac{1}{2}$  inch (2 x 4 cm) wood or equivalent may be used in lieu of toeboards;

#### **Consequences:**

Falls that could result in fractures, laceration, contusions, concussions, or death.

#### **Corrective Actions:**

- Remove the employee(s) from the scaffold.
- Train employees on the hazards related to scaffolds, working at height, and the requirement of standard (planking, fall protection, toe boards, etc.).
- Have competent person on site when erecting or altering the scaffold.
- Communicate to employees that if they are not a competent person that they are not allowed to erect or alter the scaffold.
- Have a superintendent on site at all times to ensure the previously mentioned items are being followed.
