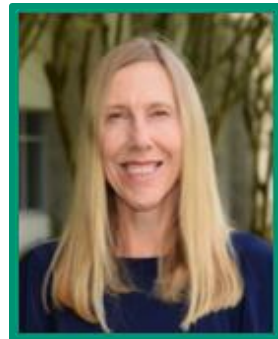

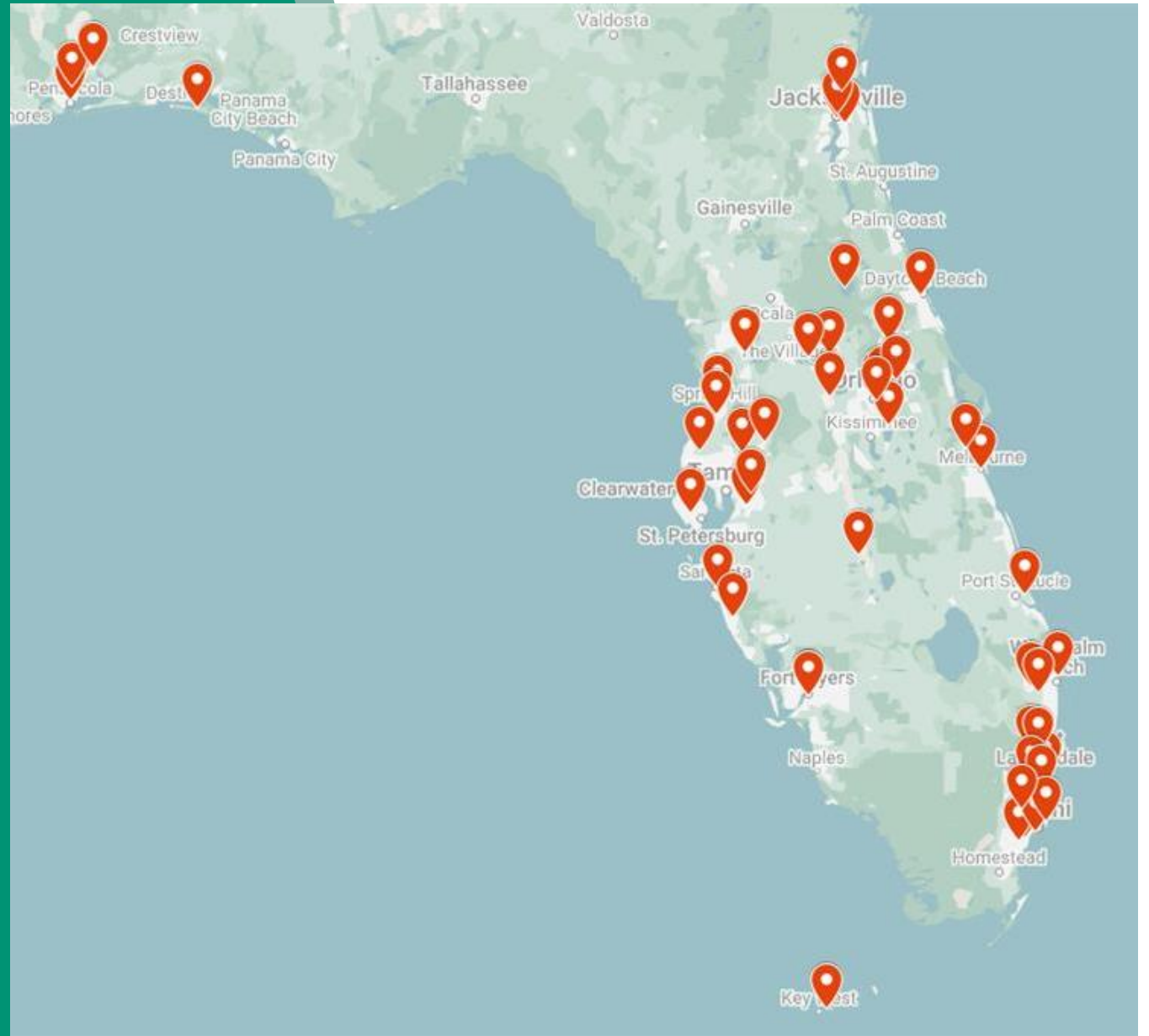


Obstetric Hemorrhage Initiative

50% of births in FL, 2023



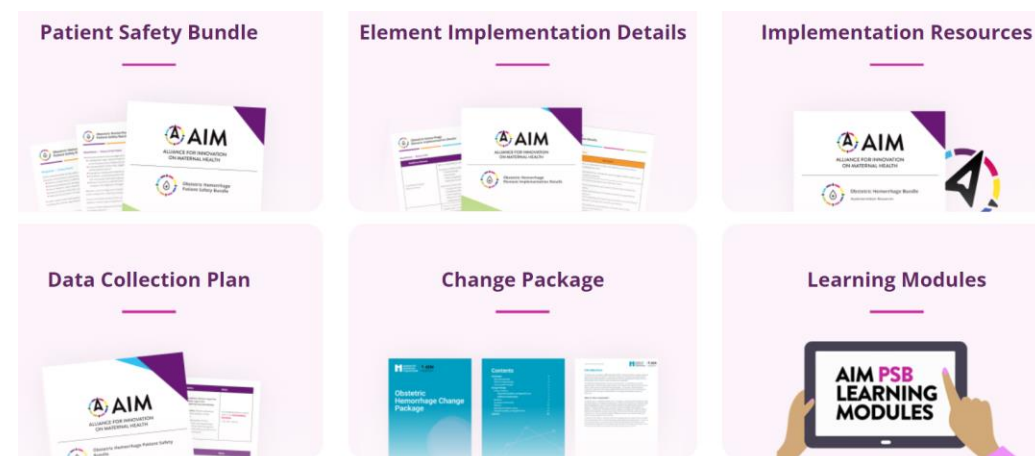
Why Focus on Obstetric Hemorrhage?

- Approximately **3-5%** of obstetric patients experience postpartum hemorrhage. These preventable events account for **11.2% of maternal deaths in the U.S.**
- In 2020, **9.1% of pregnancy-related deaths** in Florida were due to hemorrhage, and **75% of these deaths were deemed preventable** by the MMRC.

Building from OHI 1.0 and the AIM Bundle

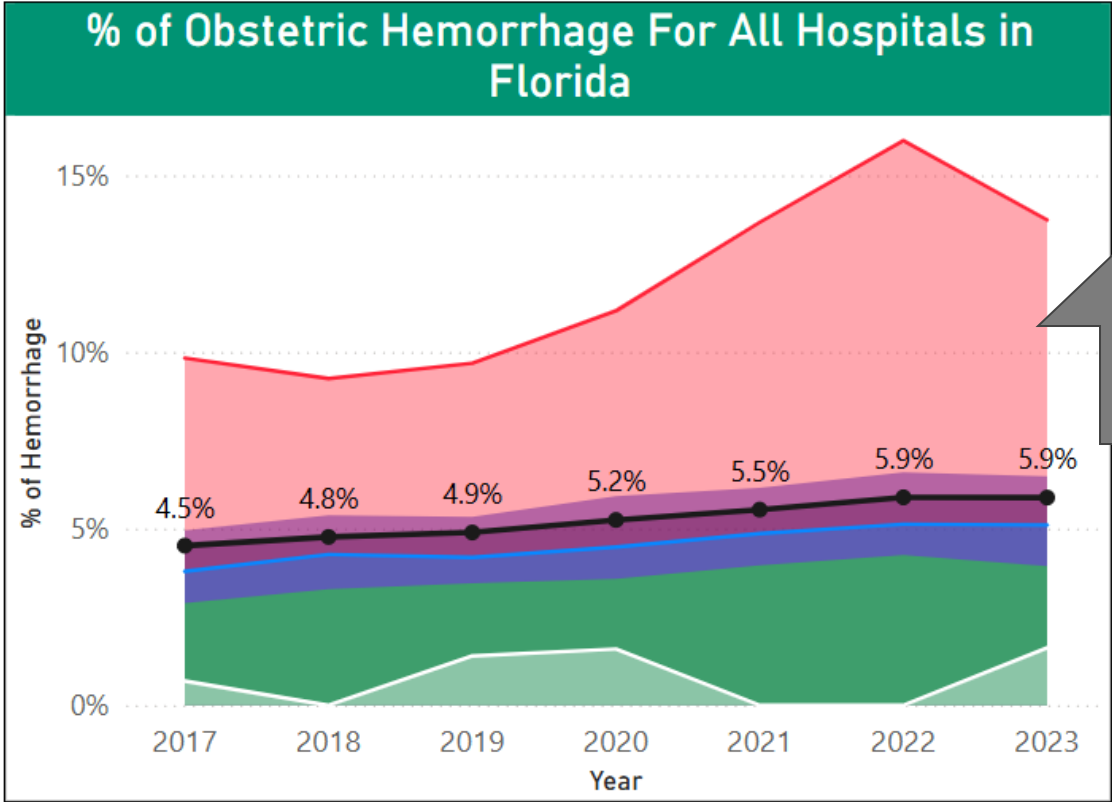
FPQC OHI initiative in 2013-2014

- The percentage of hospitals assessing **75% or more** of their patients for hemorrhage risk increased from **11% to 75%**.
- Quantification of blood loss for vaginal deliveries increased from 4% to 62%, and for cesareans from 43% to 67%.

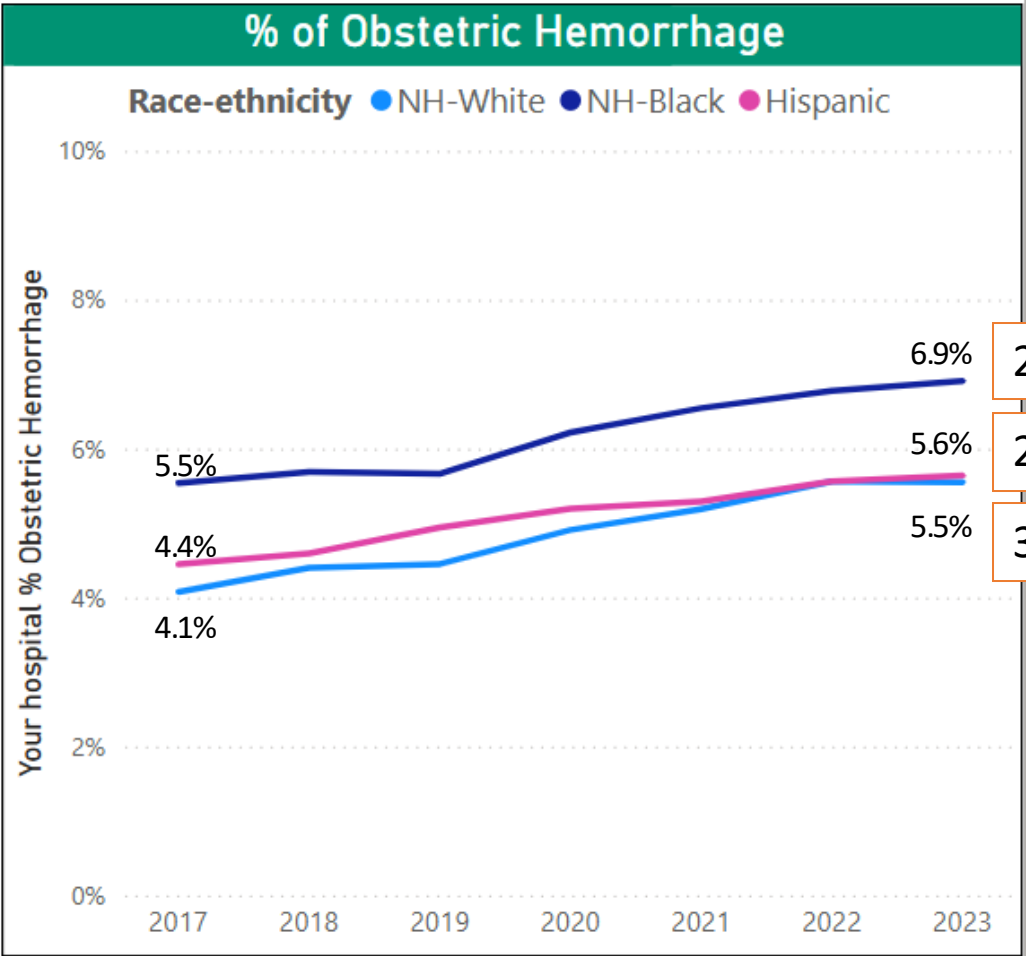

Severe Maternal Morbidity Rates among Hemorrhage Patients by Hospital Category, CMQCC Hospitals

| | Hospitals | Baseline Rate | Post Rate | Percent Reduction |
|----------------------------|-----------|---------------|-----------|-------------------|
| Not participating | 48 | 28.6 | 28.2 | 1.2% |
| No prior experience | 74 | 22.7 | 19.2 | 15.4% |
| Prior experience | 25 | 22.7 | 16.2 | 28.6% |

For every woman who dies as a result of pregnancy-related complications, up to **100 women** experience severe complications that could have potentially led to death

Florida LOMC Progress Update

- **Florida has a total of 37 verified hospitals**

49% of Florida births now occur at LOMC verified hospitals

- **11 hospitals have applications in process**
 - 1 hospital has their site visit scheduled

If all hospitals in progress achieve verification, 60% of Florida births will be at verified hospitals
